## Solution and grading scheme for Problem I (set 1)

- There is 15 questions: Q.I.1), Q.I.2) to Q.I.15),
- The order is different between the 2 sets of papers,
- Each question have only one correct answer (given below),
- Two marks for each question, « binary » mode: 2 marks if the answer is the good one, zero mark otherwise.

## List of correct answers (and their justification)

Note: justification were **not asked** during the exam.

- 1. b) (these constants only create confusion is wrong, the three others are correct, as seen in class),
- 2. b) (from one step to the next, the size of the problem is reduced by half, so there are totally  $\log_2(n)$  such steps is correct, the three others are not relevant),
- 3. c) (raise is used to force a specific exception, force does not exist, try is to start a block ended with by the except keyword),
- 4. c) (Tuples are immutable while values in lists can be changed, the three others choices are wrong),
- 5. b) (Modularity is not a specific characteristic of Object Oriented Programming (OOP), but of modules/-packages programming, while the others are),
- 6. c) (the looping variable i should not be changed inside the for loop, the three other issues are not happening here),
- 7. c) (user-defined data type is what a class in Python is),
- 8. c) (TypeError unsupported operand type(s) for /: 'int' and 'str' will be raised, because before actually performing the operation, Python checks if he can do it, and here an integer (5) and a string ('0') are incompatible for the / operator),
- 9. c) (a new file object f, with name 'myfile.txt' is correct, because the request mode 'w' is write mode, so it does not care about the fact that myfile.txt does not exist),
- 10. a) ([2015, 'Anil', 2015, 'Anil'] is the only correct answer, indeed, for a list, the right multiplication with an integer is concatenating the list with itself: 1 \* k = 1 + 1 + ... + 1 (k times)),
- 11. b) (3, because the power operator has a higher priority that the multiplicative operator, so 3\*1\*\*3 = 3
  \* (1\*\*3) = 3 \* 1 = 3),
- 12. a) (True, False, False, because d has a key named 'age', but no key named 'Name' (everything in Python is case sensitive!) neither a key named 'job'),
- 13. b) (List inside the function:, [1, 2, 3, 4] and List outside the function:, [1, 2, 3, 4] is the only correct choice, indeed the function will modify the list (on line 2), so inside the function the list is [1, 2, 3, 4] but also afterward),
- 14. c) (a = 4 and b = 5 because the while loop will conserve the fact that  $a \le b$ , and therefore stops as soon as b = 5),
- 15. a) (del d['john'] is the only correct syntax, as seen in class and in lab).
