Basics of Matlab programming, basic algorithmic

A. The very beginning

- 1. Start matlab.
- 2. Calculate 32.4/23.145 * 8.3, store the result in the variable x.
- 3. Type doc sin in the command window.
- 4. Calculate $sin(\frac{4\times\Pi}{5})$, store the result in the variable y.
- 5. Write matlab code to swap the content of the variables x and y.

B. Functions and very simple algorithms

- 1. Write a matlab function m2sum that takes two numbers and returns their sum. Look in the help: function.
- 2. Write a matlab function sequence that takes an integer n and returns the n^{th} element of the sequence (u_n) defined by:
 - $u_0 = 1$
 - $u_{n+1} = u_n + 3 * n 4$

Look in the help: for.

C. Prime numbers

- 1. Write a matlab function mgcd that takes two integers and returns their greater common divider. Look in the help: while.
- 2. Write a matlab function misprime that takes a positive integer and tells whether it is a prime number. Look in the help: if, sqrt, floor, break.

D. Algorithmic on vectors

- 1. Write a matlab function mini that takes a vector and returns its lowest element. Look in the help: Inf.
- 2. Write a matlab function mini2 that takes a vector and returns its lowest element and the index of this element.
- 3. Write a matlab function **reverse** that takes a vector and reverses it (the first element becomes the last one and so on). Look in the help: **size**, **length**, **zeros**.
- 4. Write a matlab function incsort that takes a vector and sorts it in ascending order.

E. Text printing

1. Write a matlab function **nicetext** that takes a number and prints a sentence about this number, for example: "The number is 15, thank you !". Look in the help: **fprintf**.

F. Distances

- 1. The Hamming distance between two strings of equal length is the number of positions at which the corresponding symbols are different. Write a matlab function hamming that takes two vectors and returns their hamming distance. Look in the help: assert.
- 2. The Levenshtein distance between two strings is defined as the minimum number of edits needed to transform one string into the other, with the allowable edit operations being insertion, deletion, or substitution of a single character. Write a matlab function levenshtein that takes two vectors and returns their Levenshtein distance. Look in the help: return.

G. Loading and writing data

- 1. Load the variable m contained in the file load1.mat. Sum the elements of m and put the result in a variable s that you will store in the file save1.mat. Look in the help: load, sum, save.
- 2. Load the file data1.xls and sum the third line of numerical values. Look in the help: xlsread.

H. Working with matrices

- 1. Load the matrix A from the file a.mat.
- 2. Multiply element by element the third and fifth column of A, *ie* create a colum vector z such that $\forall i, z(i) = A(i,3) * A(i,5)$. Look in the help: **arith**.
- 3. Create a column vector that contains the sum of each line of A.
- 4. Sum all the elements of A that belong to an even column.
- 5. Count the number of elements of A that are greater than 2. Look in the help: find, numel.

I. Randomness

- 1. Create a 10 by 15 matrix filled with uniformly distributed random numbers between 1 and 4. Look in the help: rand.
- 2. Create a 100 by 2 matrix filled with normally distributed random numbers with mean -2 and standard deviation 1. Look in the help: randn.

Plotting

J. 2D curves

- 1. Plot the graph of the function $x \to 3 * x^2 6 * x + 1$ over [0,10]. Look in the help: plot.
- 2. Plot the graphs of the functions sin and cos^2 over [0,5] with different colors. Add a legend to identify each function. Look in the help: legend.

K. Histograms

- 1. Create a vector A filled with 10000 uniformly distributed random numbers between 0 and 10. Plot the distribution of A. Look in the help: hist.
- 2. Same question with normally distributed random numbers with mean 8 and standard deviation 2.

L. Points

- 1. Load the file points.mat. It contains a list 1 of 2D points. Plot these points using "x" as marker on a 2D graph.
- 2. Zoom to plot only $x \in [0, 5]$ and $y \in [-1, 1]$. Look in the help: **xlim**, **ylim**.
- 3. Name the x-axis "time" and the y-axis "sales". Look in the help: xlabel, ylabel.
- 4. The file points.mat also contains standard error for each point in variable err. Plot the same graph as in q. 1 with error bars. Look in the help: errorbar.

M. Advanced plotting

- 1. Let's consider the function $f(x, y) = sin(6 \times x) + y$. Plot f over $[0, 1] \times [0, 1]$ as a 3D graph, ie z = f(x, y). Look in the help: surf.
- 2. Plot the same function as a color 2D graph, *ie* (x, y) is colored according to the value of f(x, y). Add a color scale. Look in the help: pcolor, colorbar.
- 3. Put the last two graphes on the same figure. Look in the help: subplot.
- 4. Export this figure as a pdf file named f1.pdf. Look in the help: print.

A few mathematical problems

N. Collatz problem

A Collatz sequence is defined by:

- $u_0 = a$ with $a \in \mathbb{N}^*$
- if u_n is even then $u_{n+1} = u_n/2$
- else $u_{n+1} = 3 \times u_n + 1$
- 1. Write a matlab function collatzseq that takes a and n and returns u_n for $u_0 = a$.
- 2. Write a matlab function collatz that takes a and returns the smallest n such that $u_n = 1$ (with $u_0 = a$) if such a n exists.
- 3. Do you think that such a n exists for any a?

O. Intermediate value theorem

Let's define $f(x) = x^3 + 2 * x^2 - x - 1$.

- 1. Write a matlab function **f** that takes x and returns f(x).
- 2. Calculate f(0).
- 3. Calculate f(1).
- 4. Plot the graph of f over [0, 1].
- 5. Write a matlab function solf that takes e and returns an approximate solution with an error smaller than e of f(x) = 0 over [0, 1].
- 6. Explain with mathematical arguments why we know that such a solution exists.

Probability and statistics

P. Monty Hall

From Wikipedia:

The Monty Hall problem is a famous problem in probability. The problem is based on a television game show from the United States, Let's Make a Deal. It is named for the host of this show, Monty Hall. In the problem, there are three doors. A car (prize of high value) is behind one door and goats (booby prizes of low value) behind the other two doors. First, the player chooses a door but does not open it. Then the host, who has knowledge of what is behind every door, opens a different door which he is certain has a goat behind it (opening either door with equal chances if the car is behind the player's door). Last, the host lets the player choose whether to keep what is behind the first door or to change choices to the third door (the one the host did not open). The rules of the problem are that the host has to open a door with a goat behind and has to let the player switch. The question is whether changing choices increases the chances of getting the car.

- 1. Do you think that changing choices increases the chances of getting the car?
- 2. Write matlab code to simulate the problem. Was your guess right ?
- 3. Can you explain the result you get with a mathematical proof ?

Q. Basic satistics

- 1. We randomly picked 20 men and 15 women among the world population, and recorded their size in the file humansizes.mat. Perform a statistical test that will estimate whether men are statistically taller than women. Look in the help: ttest2.
- 2. We did the same for Northern Gannet, with 30 females and 28 males, and saved the results in the file birdsizes.mat. Perform a statistical test that will estimate whether there is a size difference between males and females.

R. Central limit theorem

- 1. Read http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Central_limit_theorem. Look in the help: web.
- 2. Choose a distribution D among the ones that you can easily generate with the Statistics Toolbox (Look in the help: random.). Produce a nice plot to illustrate this distribution.
- 3. We want you to write matlab code that will numerically test this theorem for the distribution you choosed. We suggest that you write a function that:
 - Takes n, the number of independent random variables, as an argument.
 - Picks **n** independent random variables following the distribution *D* that you choosed. For us, an independent variable will be represented by a finite but large vector of values. You will have to choose this number of values or to put it as an argument of the function.
 - Sums these variables.
 - Produces a plot that shows the distribution of this sum.
 - Uses a statistical test to estimate whether the sum is normally distributed with mean and variance being the ones given by the central limit theorem. You will have to browse the help to find the appropriate test.

Differential equations

S. First order

Use matlab to get a numerical solution (*ie* a 2D curve) of the following differential equations, and use your math skills to get a formal solution when you can. We will always solve over [0,1] and take y(0)=1. Look in the help: ode45.

- 1. y' 3y = 2
- 2. $y' + 2y = e^{2x}$
- 3. $y' 5y = e^{5x}$

4.
$$y' - y = sin(x)$$

5. $(2 + x)y' = 2 - y$
6. $(1 + x)y' + y = cos(x)$
7. $(1 + x)y' + y = (1 + x)sin(x)$
8. $y' + y = sin(x) + 3sin(2x)$

T. Second order

Use matlab to get a numerical solution (*ie* a 2D curve) of the following differential equations, and use your math skills to get a formal solution when you can. We will always solve over [0,1] and take y(0)=1 and y'(0)=-1.

1. $y'' - 2y' + 2y = xe^x$ 2. $y'' - 4y' + 4y = 2(x - 2)e^x$ 3. $y'' - 4y' + 13y = 10\cos(2x) + 25\sin(2x)$ 4. $y'' + 3y' + 2y = \frac{x-1}{x^2+1}e^{-x}$ 5. $y'' + y = 3x^2 - 5x - 2$ 6. $y'' - y' - e^{2x}y = e^{3x}$ (suggestion: $u = e^x$)

U. System of equations

- 1. Use matlab to solve the following system over [0,100] with parameters r = 0.3 and m = 0.1.
 - a' = r*sin(t)*a + m*a*b m*a*c
 - b' = r*cos(t)*b + m*b*c m*b*a
 - $c' = r^* \sin(t/2)^* c + m^* c^* a m^* c^* b$

Analyzing a large set of data

Description of the raw data

The file influenza.xls contains data about mortality by influenza in United States for European American population between 1900 and 2006. "EAM" refers to European American Males, and "EAF" refers to European American Females. "Raw Data" is the number of deaths from influenza at each time point and in each age category, "Population" is the number of people alive at each time point and in each age category, "1 minus TOT" is 1 minus the mortality by any cause at each time point and in each age category.

We want to analyze these data.

Loading the data

- 1. Read the whole exercise before choosing which data you will store and how you will store them.
- 2. Be careful about possibly missing data.
- 3. You will probably have to make approximations, interpolations, ...

Output

- 1. A first kind of graph we want to extract from these data would show us, for a given time point (parameter), what is the mortality by influenza (y-axis) for each age category (x-axis).
- 2. A second kind of graph we want to extract from these data would show us, for a given age category (parameter), what is the mortality by influenza (y-axis) at each time point (x-axis).
- 3. A third kind of graph we want to extract from these data would show us, for people born in a given year (parameter), what is the mortality by influenza (y-axis) at each age (x-axis).

Plot one graph of each category. Do not forget to label the axes of your plot, add a legend, ...

Game

Choose one of the following games, and implement it !

Mastermind

You should first read http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Mastermind_(board_game).

- 1. The number of colors, the number of holes in each row and the total number of rows should be parameters.
- 2. You should first implement the codemaker part (the central function would be the one taking the correct pattern and the guess made by the codebreaker, and returning the feedback to give to the codebreaker).
- 3. Then implement the game with the user (the codebreaker) entering his guess as text.
- 4. Make a nice graphical interface.
- 5. Bonus: write an artificial intelligence that plays wisely !

Minesweeper

- 1. The size of the grid and the distribution of mines should be parameters.
- 2. We suggest that you first implement everything without graphics.
- 3. Then implement the graphical interface.
- 4. Bonus: write an artificial intelligence that plays wisely !

Sea Battle

You should first read http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Battleship_(game).

- 1. The size of the grid, the number of boats, ... should be parameters.
- 2. We suggest that you first implement everything without graphics.
- 3. Do not forget that the players should be able to choose their position of his boats.
- 4. Implement the graphical interface for a 2 players mode.
- 5. Bonus: write an artificial intelligence that plays against a human player.

Snake

- 1. Try to summarize with your words what is seam carving and what are the interests and weaknesses compared to other resizing techniques.
- 2. We want you to implement seam carving with matlab ! Here are the steps we suggest:
 - Identify the arguments of the matlab function.
 - Load the image (*Look in the help:* imread.).
 - Compute the energy matrix.
 - Choose and implement an algorithm to find the best seam to remove.
 - Perfom the removal and update the energy matrix.
 - Loop the last two steps.
 - Save the image (Look in the help: imwrite.).
- 3. Test on several images (http://images.google.com/).
- 4. Every improvement or innovation you can do is welcome ! For example you can try to use other energy functions, to improve the performance of your program, to add a user interface ...

Detecting bacteria

Digit recognition
