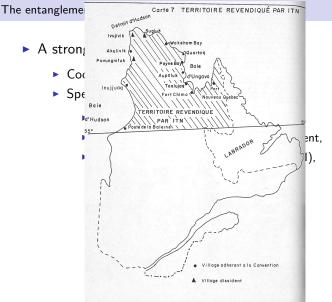

# The routine character of cooperative consumption

Shopping at the Cooperative: a routine everyday practice

- Routine in consumption (Wahlen 2011)
- Familiar and well-known space
  - which serves as a framework for regular practices
- Service center
- One of the scarce "third places" (Oldenburg 1989)
- Sructural social institution at the local level

# The routine character of cooperative consumption

Resulting from strategical promotion and routinization of the Cooperative

- Ethnic and cultural proximity between the Cooperative and consumers
  - Organizational display of continuity with "traditional" practices of sharing (Gombay 2010)
  - But cooperation was explicitly taught
- Defense of local community identity (dissidence)
- Identification between the Cooperative and collaborative community development and Inuit identity
- ➤ → an effective strategy: Cooperative is now seen as "tradition"

## The dangers of routine? Activism at the risk of mundanity

The gap between routine behavior and political motivations

- Methodologically: observing ruptures of the norm
- Contesting Cooperative's norms
- Operating economic rationality
- "Retaliating" against the Cooperative
  - Cf. Hervé (2017) on the legitimacy of political institutions among the Inuit
- A more general pitfall for collaborative economy? (Jacquet 2015)

## Between activism and mundanity

Socially differentiated meanings of Cooperative consumption

### [Ideal type 1] The activist cooperator

- Supporting the Cooperative through political consumerism
- Active in the Cooperative governance
- Knowledgeable about cooperation and dissidence
- Belonging to activist (familial) network; transmission of high activist and cultural capital (Baumann et al. 2015)
- Viewing the cooperative as a continuation of sharing economy — which they actively participate in

### [Ideal type 2] The mundane consumer

- Most likely to shop elsewhere, see the Cooperative as a profit-oriented organization, ...
- Still their primary choice

- Sketching social differentiation
