Quantum dynamics for a Cantor spectrum, tightbinding model - log-periodic behaviour as a consequence of time-averaging

This note is about the signature of the fractal structure of the spectrum in timeaveraged dynamical quantities. The model studied is the same as in the notes of June 1 (tight-binding model and Cantor spectrum).

As showed in the notes of 1 June, the wave function is given by :

$$\psi(k,t) = \int_{K} \phi_{\epsilon}(1)^{*} \phi_{\epsilon}(k) e^{-i\epsilon t} d\mu$$
$$= \int_{K} |\phi_{1}(\epsilon)|^{2} p_{k}(\epsilon) e^{-i\epsilon t} d\mu$$

We define $|\phi_1(\epsilon)|^2 d\mu$ as the local measure associated to ψ ; for simplicity we write now $|\phi_1(\epsilon)|^2 d\mu = d\mu$. Using : $p_k(x) = \sum_{0 \le j_k \le k} c_{j_k} x^{j_k}$, we have :

$$\psi(k,t) = \sum_{j_k \le k} c_{j_k} \int_K \epsilon^{j_k} e^{-i\epsilon t} d\mu$$

Since the RMS (and many other dynamical quantities) can be expressed in terms of the amplitude of ψ at the sites of the lattice, namely $|\psi(k,t)|^2$, the dynamics of the system depends essentially on the cumulants :

$$h_k(t) = \int_K e^{-i\epsilon t} \epsilon^k d\mu(\epsilon)$$

The $h_k(t)$ are not scaling functions, and therefore neither is the RMS. However, we showed that there is a structure and some invariant properties, with dynamical implications which were discussed in the notes of June 1.

We discuss here the influence of time-averaging : instead of studying instantaneous dynamical quantities, we are interested in their time average, given by the transformation $\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t$. Thus, we study $\frac{1}{t} |\psi(k, t')|^2 dt'$, which narrows down to the study of the quantities :

$$\frac{1}{t}\int_0^t h_k^*(t')h_l(t')dt'$$

Since $|\psi(k,t)|^2$ is real, we need only to consider the real part of $\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t h_k^*(t') h_l(t') dt'$, which we note $f_{k,l}(t)$. A standard calculation leads to :

$$f_{k,l}(t) = \Re\left(\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t h_k^*(t')h_l(t')dt'\right)$$
$$= \iint_{K \times K} x^k x'^l \operatorname{sinc}((x'-x)t)d\mu(x)d\mu(x'$$

Note that $f_{0,0}(t)$ is the time-averaged return probability $C(t) = \frac{1}{t} \int_0^t |\langle \psi(0) | \psi(t') \rangle|^2 dt'$, which we calculated exactly and which we know to have the following asymptotic expression :

$$C(t) \sim_{t \to \infty} \frac{t^{-d_K}}{\ln(3)} \sum_n \gamma_n t^{-\frac{2i\pi n}{\ln(3)}} \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{2}(d_{K,n}-1)\right) \Gamma(d_{K,n}-1)$$

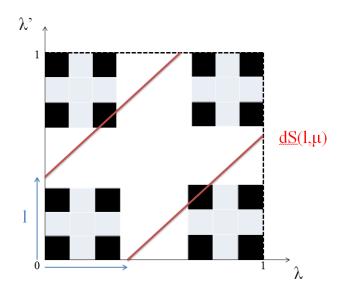


FIGURE 1 – 2 dimensional Cantor dust (represented here at the second step of construction); the infinitesimal surface $dS(l,\mu)$ corresponds to the surface of the Cantor dust, in the sense of $d\mu$, contained in the two red strips.

with $d_K = \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3}$. The asymptotic behaviour of C(t) can be intuited by the following observation : using the scaling property of the measure, we find that :

$$C(t) = \frac{1}{2}C(t/3) + \frac{1}{2}\iint_{K \times K} sinc(\frac{x - x' + 2}{3}t)d\mu(x)d\mu(x')$$

When $t \to \infty$, the second term of the sum on the right tends to zero, since for all x, x' in K, 1 < x - x' + 2 < 3. Thus, C(t) is asymptotically a scaling function :

$$C(t) \sim_{t \to \infty} \frac{1}{2} C(t/3)$$

This is due to the *sinc* in the expression of C(t) : C(t) is a wavelet transform of the spectrum. For the same reason, we expect $\iint x^k x'^l sinc((x'-x)t)d\mu(x)d\mu(x')$ to be, asymptotically, a scaling function.

For the calculation of C(t), we used the change of variable l = |x - x'| and reduced the problem to calculating the area $dS(l, \mu)$ (see fig. 1). The log-periodic behaviour comes from the expression of $dS(l, \mu)$.

If we make the approximation that : sinc(xt) = 1 for $|xt| < \pi$ and sinc(xt) = 0 elsewhere, we get the following approximate expression for C(t) :

$$C(t) = \int_{l=0}^{\pi/t} dS(l,\mu) = t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3} \sum_{n} d_n t^{-2i\pi n/\ln 3}$$

which accounts for the typical asymptotic behaviour, although the coefficients d_n are a little bit different from the coefficients in the exact expression.

If we apply the same reasoning for $f_{k,l}(t) = \iint x^k x'^l \operatorname{sinc}((x'-x)t) d\mu(x) d\mu(x')$, we find :

$$f_{k,l}(t) \approx \iint_{|x-x'| < \frac{\pi}{t}} x^k x'^l d\mu(x) d\mu(x')$$

Using a similar method as for C(t), we can show that (see detail in the next section):

$$\iint_{|x-x'|<\frac{\pi}{t}} x^k x'^l d\mu(x) d\mu(x') = t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3} \left[G(\ln t) + \mathcal{O}\left(\frac{1}{t}\right) \right]$$

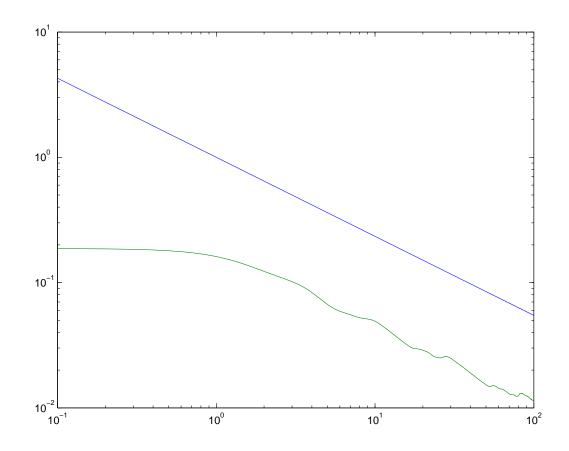


FIGURE 2 – Loglog scale graphs of $f_{1,2}(t)$ (green) and $t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3}$ (blue)

See a graph of $f_{1,2}(t)$ fig. 2.

Note that this implies that the wave function has the following asymptotic behaviour : $\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t |\psi(k,t')|^2 dt' \sim t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3}$, which is consistent with the results of Guarneri [1].

Now, since

$$f_{k,l}(t) = \iint x^k x'^l \operatorname{sinc}((x'-x)t) d\mu(x) d\mu(x') \sim_{t \to \infty} t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3} G(\ln t/\ln 3)$$

we deduce, adapting the argument of Guarneri in [1], the following lower-bound for the time-averaged RMS :

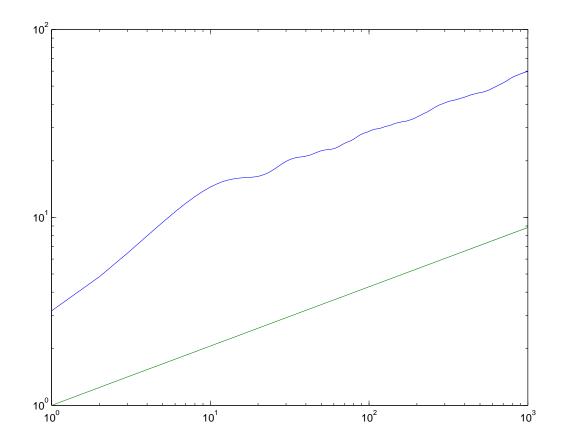


FIGURE 3 – Loglog scale graphs of $\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t \Delta x(t') dt'$ (blue) and $t^{\frac{\ln 2}{2 \ln 3}}$ (green)

$$\frac{1}{t} \int_0^t \Delta x(t') dt' \ge t^{\frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3}}$$

which is consistent with the numerics (fig. 3).

Calculation of $f_{k,l}(t)$

We give the analytical expression of the approximated function for $f_{k,l}(t)$, which we call

$$r_{k,l}(t) = \iint_{|x-x'| < \frac{\pi}{t}} x^k x'^l d\mu(x) d\mu(x')$$

We show that :

$$r_{k,l}(t) = t^{-\ln 2/\ln 3} \left[G(\ln t) + \mathcal{O}\left(\frac{1}{t}\right) \right]$$

We follow a similar method as for C(t).

First, we calculate the infinitesimal area $dS_{k,l}(u,\mu)$, which is the integral of $x^k y^l$, for the measure $d\mu$, on the two strips y = x + u and y = x - u (red strips on fig. 1):

$$dS_{k,l}(u,\mu) = \int_{K} (x^{k}(x+u)^{l}\theta(1-u-x) + x^{k}(x-u)^{l}\theta(x-u))d\mu(x)$$

To derive $dS_{k,l}(u,\mu)$, we study the poles of its Mellin transform and apply the residue theorem. The Mellin transform is :

$$m_{k,l}(s) = \int_0^1 u^{s-1} dS_{k,l}(u,\mu) = \iint_{K \times K} x^k y^l |x-y|^{s-1} d\mu d\mu$$

We now show by recurrence that the poles of $m_{k,l}(s)$ is the set :

$$S_{k,l} = \{1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} - j + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}; j \in [|0, k+l|], n \in \mathbb{Z}\}$$

Initialization :

 $m_{0,0}(s) = \iint_{K \times K} |x - y|^{s-1}$ has been calculated for C(t) and has poles at $S_{0,0} =$

$$\left\{1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}; n \in \mathbb{Z}\right\}.$$

Inductive step :

using the symmetry of the measure, we find :

$$m_{k,l}(s) = \iint_{K \times K} x^k y^l |x - y|^{s - 1} d\mu d\mu$$

= $\frac{3^{1 - s - (k + l)}}{4} \iint_{K \times K} x^k y^l |x - y|^{s - 1} d\mu d\mu$
+ $\frac{3^{1 - s - (k + l)}}{4} \iint_{K \times K} (x + 2)^k (y + 2)^l |x - y|^{s - 1} d\mu d\mu + R_{k,l}(s)$

with

$$R_{k,l}(s) = \frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{4} \iint_{K \times K} (x+2)^k y^l |x-y+2|^{s-1} d\mu d\mu + \frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{4} \iint_{K \times K} x^k (y+2)^l |x-y-2|^{s-1} d\mu d\mu$$

has no poles. Expanding the second term :

$$m_{k,l}(s) = \frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{4} \iint_{K \times K} x^k y^l |x-y|^{s-1} d\mu d\mu$$

+ $\frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{4} \sum_{i=0}^k \sum_{j=0}^l \binom{k}{i} \binom{l}{j} 2^{k+l-i-j} \iint_{K \times K} x^i y^j |x-y|^{s-1} d\mu d\mu + R_{k,l}(s)$
= $\frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{2} m_{k,l}(s) + \frac{3^{1-s-(k+l)}}{4} \sum_{\substack{i=1 \ i=1 \ j=1 \ (i,j) \neq (k,l)}}^k \sum_{j=1}^l \binom{k}{j} \binom{l}{j} 2^{k+l-i-j} m_{i,j}(s) + R_{k,l}(s)$

Thus, the poles of $m_{k,l}(s)$ is the set of the poles of all the $m_{i,j}(s)$ with $i \leq k$ and $j \leq l$, plus the set of complex points $\{1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} - (k+l) + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}; n \in \mathbb{Z}\}$. Using the induction hypothesis, we conclude that the poles of $m_{k,l}(s)$ is the set :

$$S_{k,l} = \{1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} - j + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}; j \in [[0, k+l]], n \in \mathbb{Z}\}$$

which completes the proof.

Now, we apply the inverse Mellin transform and use the residue formula to find $dS_{k,l}(u,\mu)$:

$$dS_{k,l}(u,\mu) = \frac{1}{2i\pi} \int \gamma - i\infty^{\gamma+i\infty} u^{s-1} m_{k,l}(s) ds$$
$$= \sum_{j=0}^{k+l} \sum n \in \mathbb{Z} c_{j,n} u^{j+\alpha-1-2i\pi/\ln 3}$$

with $\alpha = \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3}$ and

$$c_{j,n} = R_{k,l}\left(1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} - j + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}\right) + \sum_{\substack{i=1 \ i'=1\\i+i'\neq j}}^{k} \sum_{\substack{i'=1\\i+i'\neq j}}^{l} \binom{k}{i'} 2^{k+l-i-j} m_{i,j}\left(1 - \frac{\ln 2}{\ln 3} - j + \frac{2i\pi n}{\ln 3}\right)$$

By integrating, we obtain $\boldsymbol{r}_{k,l}(t)$:

$$r_{k,l}(t) = \int_0^{1/t} dS(u,\mu)$$

= $\sum_{j=0}^{k+l} \sum n \in \mathbb{Z} \int_0^{1/t} c_{j,n} u^{j+\alpha-1-2i\pi/\ln 3}$
= $t^{-\alpha} \sum_{j=0}^{k+l} \sum n \in \mathbb{Z} c_{j,n} \frac{t^{-j+2i\pi n/\ln 3}}{\alpha+j-2i\pi n/\ln 3}$

Thus :

$$r_{k,l}(t) = t^{-\alpha} \left[G(\ln t) + \mathcal{O}\left(\frac{1}{t}\right) \right]$$

with $G(\ln t) = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \frac{t^{2i\pi n/\ln 3}}{\alpha - 2i\pi n/\ln 3} c_{0,n}$.
