21. Write a Python program for evaluating the value of x from the simple linear equation

$$ax+b=0$$

The value of x has to be evaluated from the values of a and b, which are in turn to be obtained from the user by request.

Thus your program will first ask the user to enter values of *a* and*b*, and then use these to compute *x* from the above formula. At the end, the obtained value of *x* will be printed.

<u>Marks</u>: 8. Semantics of the program, i.e. does it do what it is supposed to do, will carry more marks than Syntax of the language.

22. Write a Python program for evaluating the 2 roots of a quadratic equation of the form

$$ax^2 + bx + c = 0$$

where a, b and c are to be individually obtained from the user by request. Use your knowledge of mathematical formulae for evaluating the roots of a quadratic equation and write Python code for the same. Importantly, check that the discriminant (quantity under the root sign) is non-negative, and if it fails this check, then an error message saying "Real roots do not exist" is printed and the program ends. When the check is satisfied, the values of the two roots are calculated and then printed.

<u>Marks</u>: 15. Semantics of the program, i.e. does it do what it is supposed to do, will carry more marks than Syntax of the language.

23. A program for evaluating the square root of a number supplied by the user, which you have seen before, is supplied below. Now, at start before calling the function, introduce a check that if the user mistakenly enters a negative number, the program catches an error and says "Please enter only positive numbers" and then ends. You do not need to write additional lines of code for this. Instead, write a flowchart for the complete program that includes the below lines plus this additional check.

24. A function x(t) (distance x as function of time t) is given as $x(t) = 10t + 5t^2$

Evaluate the derivative of x with respect to t at t = 5, both algebraically and numerically. For the algebraic evaluation, use mathematical formulae that you have learnt earlier. For numerical evaluation, use backward, forward and central differences that you have learnt before in your Maths classes. Compare each of the three numerically evaluated values against the algebraic value and decide which among them is most accurate.

The above problem is solved in the program provided below. However, this program has a few errors, in particular, five Syntax and two Semantic errors. You have to spot and list out these errors. Further, you need to write out what the final printed output from the program would be if all the Syntax and Semantic errors were corrected (do not worry about blank spaces and new lines).

<u>Hint</u>: Syntax errors are grammatical mistakes in the language of the program – those for which an interpreter/ compiler will throw errors. Semantic errors represent mismatches between what the program is supposed to do, and what it is actually doing – and an interpreter/ compiler will not detect semantic errors.

<u>Marks</u>: One for spotting each Syntax error, five for each Semantic error, and ten for correctly representing the final print statement from the program. *You need to write down in your answer sheet the locations in the programs where these errors are.*
