- Q.1) Is the real sequence $u = (u_n)_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$ defined by $u_n = \frac{1}{\sqrt{5}} \left(\frac{1 + \sqrt{5}}{2} \right)^n$ convergent?
 - **A)** No, $u_n \xrightarrow[n \to +\infty]{} +\infty$

C) No, u_n is not even correctly defined!

B) Yes, and it converges to $\frac{1}{\sqrt{5}}$

- **D)** No, $u_n \xrightarrow[n \to +\infty]{} -\infty$
- Q.2) Let S be the series sum of the terms $a_n = \frac{1}{n(n+3)}$ for n > 0, ie $S = \sum_{n=1}^{+\infty} a_n = \sum_{n=1}^{+\infty} \frac{1}{n(n+3)}$. Is S convergent?
 - **A)** Yes (a series of positive terms always converges!)
- **D)** Yes (thanks to the comparison test, the inequal-
- **B)** Yes (obvious, just because $a_n \underset{n \to +\infty}{\longrightarrow} 0$)
- ity $a_n < \frac{1}{n^2}$ and because $\sum_{n=1}^{+\infty} \frac{1}{n^2}$ converges)
- C) No (S will be infinite = $+\infty$ because $a_n > 0$)

Bonus: (for +2 marks) Can you quickly (but carefully) compute the value of the sum of the series?

$$\sum_{n=1}^{+\infty} \frac{1}{n(n+3)} = ?$$

- Q.3) What are the solutions of this 1st order differential equation y' + 2y = 0?
- Q.4) For this non-homogeneous equation $y' + 2y = x^2$, we add the initial value y(1) = 0. Which one of these functions is a solution?
 - **A)** $y(x) = \frac{1}{2}x^2 \frac{1}{2}x + 2$

- C) $y(x) = \frac{1}{2}x^2 + 4e^{-2x}$
- **B)** $y(x) = \frac{1}{2}x^2 \frac{1}{2}x + \frac{1}{4} \frac{1}{4}e^{2-2x}$
- **D)** $y(x) = \frac{1}{4} + \frac{7}{4}e^2e^{-2x}$
- Q.5) What are the solution(s) of this homogeneous 2^{nd} order differential equation y'' + 2y' 8y = 0?
