## 1 Absolute Sums

We recall that for all real numbers, the absolute value of $x$ is written $|x|$, and is defined like $|x| \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}$ $\max (x,-x)=x$ if $x \geqslant 0$ else $-x$.

1. Given that $x$ and $y$ are integers, how many different solutions does the equation $|x|+2|y|=100$ have?
2. If $k$ is a positive integer (odd or even), try to investigate the number of solutions of the equation $|x|+2|y|=k$.
3. What about the equation $|x|+3|y|=k$ ?

## 2 Factorial Divisibility

Given that $n$ is a positive integer, prove that $\left(2^{n}\right)$ ! is divisible by $2^{2 n-1}$.

## 3 prime numbers?

Given that $(a, b, c) \in \mathbb{N}^{*}$ are three non-negative integers, if we have $a b c+a b+b c+c a+a+b+c=1001$, what is the value of $a+b+c$ ?

Hint: $1001=7 \times 11 \times 13$.

## 4 Cables

A telephone company places round cables in round ducts.
Assuming the diameter of a cable is 2 cm , what would the diameter of the duct be for two cables, three cables and four cables?

## 5 Alternating Sign Square Sum

We recall that $T_{n}$, the $n^{\text {th }}$ triangle number is defined as $T_{n} \stackrel{\text { def }}{=} 1+2+. .+n$.
It can be seen that $6^{2}-5^{2}+4^{2}-3^{2}+2^{2}-1^{2}=21=T_{6}$, the sixth triangle number.
Prove that for any $n \in \mathbb{N}^{*}, T_{n}=n^{2}-(n-1)^{2}+(n-2)^{2}-. .-1^{2}$.

## 6 About continuity

Let $f$ be a function from an interval $[a, b]$ to $\mathbb{R}$ (with $\left.(a, b) \in \mathbb{R}^{2}, a \leqslant b\right)$, and $x_{0} \in[a, b]$.

1. Recall the formal definition of $f$ being continuous in this point $x_{0}$ (as a formula with variables well introduced with quantifiers $\forall$ and $\exists$ ).
2. If $f$ is continuous in $x_{0}$, does this means $f$ is differentiable in $x_{0}$ ? If yes, try to prove it. If not, try to give a counter-example ${ }^{17}$

a!b!=a!+b!+2^{c} .
$$

## 8 Falling Sound

A boy drops a stone down a well and hears the splash from the bottom after three seconds (3s). Given that sound travels at a constant speed of $300 \mathrm{~m} / \mathrm{s}$ and the acceleration of the stone due to gravity is $10 \mathrm{~m} / \mathrm{s}^{2}$, how deep is the well?

## 9 Converging Root

Consider the iterative formula, $u_{n+1}=\sqrt{u_{n}}+2, \forall n \in \mathbb{N}$. By investigating the behavior it should become clear to you that, for all positive starting values, this sequence $\left(u_{n}\right)_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$ converges to the limit value of 4 .

What form must the positive integer, $m$, take, for the iterative formula $u_{n+1}=\sqrt{u_{n}}+m, \forall n \in \mathbb{N}$, to converge to an integral root?

## 10 Bag of Balls

Three balls are placed inside a cone such that each ball is in contact with the edge of the cone and the next ball.

If the radii of the balls are $20 \mathrm{~cm}, 12 \mathrm{~cm}$ and $r \mathrm{~cm}$ respectively, what is the value of $r$ ?

## 11 About differentiability

## 13 Cubes and Multiples of 7

Prove that for any number that is not a multiple of seven, then its cube will be one more or one less than a multiple of 7 .

Formally, this would be written as :

$$
\forall n \in \mathbb{N}^{*}, 7 \times n \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}>7 \mid n^{3} \pm 1 .
$$

## 14 Continuity and uniform continuity

Let $f$ be a function from an interval $[a, b]$ to $\mathbb{R}$ (with $\left.(a, b) \in \mathbb{R}^{2}, a \leqslant b\right)$, and $x_{0} \in[a, b]$.

1. Let call $\varphi_{1}$ this first formula :

$$
\forall x \in[a, b], \forall \varepsilon>0, \exists \eta_{x, \varepsilon}>0,\left(\forall y \in[a, b],|y-x|<\eta_{x, \varepsilon} \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}>|f(y)-f(x)|<\varepsilon\right) .
$$

2. Let call $\varphi_{2}$ this second formula :

$$
\forall \varepsilon>0, \exists \eta_{\varepsilon}>0,\left(\forall(x, y) \in[a, b]^{2},|y-x|<\eta_{\varepsilon} \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}>|f(y)-f(x)|<\varepsilon\right) .
$$

3. Which formula is the strongest? Do we have $\varphi_{1} \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}>\varphi_{2}$ or $\varphi_{2} \stackrel{\text { def }}{=}>\varphi_{1}$ (or neither of these two logical implications)?
4. (Bonus:) Can you give the name of the property formally expressed by the formula $\varphi_{1}$ ?
5. (Bonus) And what about the second property $\varphi_{2}$ ?
