• Si $f(x) = x^2 + x + 1$, alors une sol part est de la forme: $y_p = ax^2 + bx + c$

Si $f(x) = e^x(x+1)$, $y_p = (ax+b)e^x$

Si $f(x) = e^{-2x}(x+1)$ $y_p = \cancel{x}(ax+b)e^{-2x} = (ax^2 + bx)e^{-2x}$

Si $f(x) = e^x$ $y_p = ae^x$

Si $f(x) = (x^2 + x + 1) e^{-2x}$. . . $y_p = \cancel{x}(ax^2 + bx + c)e^{-2x} = (ax^3 + bx^2 + cx)e^{-2x}$

Si $f(x) = 3\sin x + 4\cos x$ $y_p = a \sin x + b \cos x$

Si $f(x) = 2\sin x$ $y_p = a \sin x + b \cos x$

$$y'_H + 2y_H = e^{-2x}(x+1)$$

$$\underline{y_H = A e^{-2x} \text{ où } A \in \mathbb{R}}$$

Sol particulièrè :

première méthode : $y_p = (ax^2 + bx) e^{-2x}$

$$y_p' = (2ax+b)e^{-2x} - 2(ax^2+bx)e^{-2x}$$

$$y_p' + 2y_p = e^{-2x}(x+1)$$

$$(u.v)' = u'v + u v'$$

$$\Leftrightarrow \underbrace{(2ax+b)e^{-2x}}_{y_p'} - \cancel{2(ax^2+bx)e^{-2x}} + \cancel{2(ax^2+bx)e^{-2x}} = e^{-2x}(x+1)$$

$$\underline{y_p = (\frac{1}{2}x^2+x)e^{-2x}}$$

Sols de l'éq complète : $y = \underline{A e^{-2x} + (\frac{1}{2}x^2+x)e^{-2x}}$ où $A \in \mathbb{R}$

$$y = (A + \frac{1}{2}x^2+x) e^{-2x}$$

2^{ème} méthode : avec la M.V.C (c'est aussi l'exo 3)

③ $y' + 2y = e^{-2x}(x+1)$

H.O.T.: $y_H = A e^{-2x}$ où $A \in \mathbb{R}$

Sol part: M.V.C. On pose $y_p = A(x)e^{-2x}$

$$y_p' = A'(x)e^{-2x} - 2A(x)e^{-2x}$$

$$\begin{aligned} y_p' + 2y_p &= A'(x)e^{-2x} - 2A(x)e^{-2x} + 2A(x)e^{-2x} \\ &= (x+1)e^{-2x} \Rightarrow A'(x) = x+1 \Rightarrow A(x) = \int (x+1)dx = \frac{x^2}{2} + x \end{aligned}$$

donc $\underline{y_p = \left(\frac{x^2}{2} + x\right)e^{-2x}}$

Sols de l'éq complète : $y = A e^{-2x} + \left(\frac{x^2}{2} + x\right) e^{-2x}$

$$\boxed{y = \left(A + \frac{x^2}{2} + x\right) e^{-2x}} \quad \text{où } A \in \mathbb{R}$$

$$\textcircled{2} \quad y' + 2y = 3 \sin x + 4 \cos x$$

• HOM: $y' + 2y = 0$ $y_H = A e^{-2x}$ où $A \in \mathbb{R}$

• Sol part: sous la forme $y_2 = a \sin x + b \cos x$

$$y_2' = a \cos x - b \sin x$$

$$y_2' + 2y_2 = a \cos x - b \sin x + 2a \sin x + 2b \cos x = (2a - b) \sin x + (2b + a) \cos x \\ = 3 \sin x + 4 \cos x$$

$$\begin{cases} 2a - b = 3 \\ 2b + a = 4 \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \times 2 \begin{cases} 4a - 2b = 6 \\ 2b + a = 4 \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} L_1 + L_2 \\ 5a = 10 \end{cases} \begin{cases} a = 2 \\ 2b + a = 4 \end{cases}$$

$$\Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} a = 2 \\ 2b = 4 - a = 2 \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} a = 2 \\ b = 1 \end{cases} \quad y_2 = 2 \sin x + \cos x$$

• Sols de l'éq complète : $y = A e^{-2x} + 2 \sin x + \cos x$ où $A \in \mathbb{R}$

• La sol telle $y(0) = 4$: $y(0) = A \cdot 1 + 2 \cdot 0 + 1 = 4 \Rightarrow A = 3$

$$y = 3e^{-2x} + 2 \sin x + \cos x$$

$$(5a) 2xy' + y = x^{3/2}$$

$$\text{HOM: } 2xy' + y = 0 \quad y_H = A e^{-\int \frac{1}{2x} dx} = A e^{-\frac{1}{2} \int \frac{1}{x} dx} = A e^{-\frac{1}{2} \ln x}$$

$$a \ln(b) = \ln(b^a)$$

$$y_H = A e^{\ln(x^{-1/2})}$$

$$y_H = Ax^{-1/2} \quad \text{ou } A \in \mathbb{R}$$

Sol part: MVC

$$y_2 = A(x) x^{-1/2}$$

$$y_2' = A'(x)x^{-1/2} + A(x) \left[-\frac{1}{2}x^{-3/2} \right]$$

$$2xy_2' + y_2 = 2x(A'_x x^{-1/2} - \frac{1}{2}A(x)x^{-3/2}) + A(x)x^{-1/2}$$

$$= 2A'(x)x^{1/2} - A(x)x^{1/2} + A(x)x^{1/2} = x^{3/2}$$

$$2A'(x)x^{1/2} = x^{3/2} \Rightarrow A'(x) = \frac{1}{2} \frac{x^{3/2}}{x^{1/2}} = \frac{1}{2}x^{3/2-1/2} = \frac{1}{2}x^1$$

$$A'(x) = \frac{1}{2}x \Rightarrow A(x) = \int \frac{1}{2}x dx = \frac{1}{2} \int x dx = \frac{1}{2} \frac{x^2}{2} = \frac{x^2}{4} = A$$

$$y_2 = \frac{x^2}{4} \cdot x^{-1/2} = \underline{\underline{\frac{x^{3/2}}{4}}} = y_2$$

Sols de l'éq complète :

$$y = Ax^{-1/2} + \frac{x^{3/2}}{4}$$

4a) $y' + 2y = 4x + (4x-11)e^{2x}$

- HOM $y' + 2y = 0$

$$y_H = Ae^{-2x} \quad \text{où } A \in \mathbb{R}$$

- Sol part pour l'éq $y' + 2y = 4x$ $y_1 = ax + b$ $y'_1 = a$

$$\begin{aligned} y'_1 + 2y_1 &= a + 2(ax+b) = 2ax + a + 2b \\ &= 4x \end{aligned} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 2a = 4 \\ a + 2b = 0 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} a = 2 \\ b = -1 \end{cases}$$

$$y_1 = 2x - 1$$

- Sol part pour $y' + 2y = (4x-11)e^{2x}$: $y_2 = (ax+b)e^{2x}$ ou MVC

$$y'_2 = a e^{2x} + 2(ax+b)e^{2x}$$

$$\begin{aligned} y'_2 + 2y_2 &= a e^{2x} + (2ax+2b)e^{2x} + (2ax+2b)e^{2x} = e^{2x}(4ax + a + 4b) \\ &= (4x-11)e^{2x} \quad \begin{cases} 4a = 4 \\ a + 4b = -11 \end{cases} \Leftrightarrow \begin{cases} a = 1 \\ 4b = -12 \end{cases} \quad b = -3 \end{aligned}$$

$$y_2 = (x-3)e^{2x}$$

- Sol de l'éq complète: $y = y_H + y_1 + y_2$

$$y = Ae^{-2x} + 2x - 1 + (x-3)e^{2x} \quad \text{Principe de Superposition}$$
