$$
\frac{\delta f(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{y})}{\delta \mathbf{x}} = f(\mathbf{x} + 1, \mathbf{y}) - f(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{y})
$$

Definition (Length ODE)

A function **f** is "length-ODE" definable (from u , g and h) if it is a solution of

$$
f(0, \mathbf{y}) = \mathbf{g}(\mathbf{y}) \quad \text{and} \quad \frac{\delta \mathbf{f}(x, \mathbf{y})}{\delta \ell} = \mathbf{u}(\mathbf{f}(x, \mathbf{y}), \mathbf{h}(x, \mathbf{y}), x, \mathbf{y}). \tag{1}
$$

Formal synonym for right-hand side of [\(1\)](#page-11-0): $f(x + 1, y) = f(x, y) + (\ell(x + 1) - \ell(x)) \cdot u(f(x, y), h(x, y), x, y)$ Derivation with respect to the length $=$ change of variable.

Variation when:

$$
\ell(x+1)-\ell(x)\neq 0
$$

Inspired by:

$$
\frac{\delta f(x, \mathbf{y})}{\delta x} = \frac{\delta \ell(x)}{\delta x} \cdot \frac{\delta f(x, \mathbf{y})}{\delta \ell(x)}.
$$

Motivation behind Length-ODEs

Fig. 5. A continuous system before and after an exponential speed-up.

Re-scaling: $\phi_1(t) = \theta(e^t)$

Now "time-complexity" is measured by the length of the solution curve of the ODE.

Theorem (Bournez & Durand, '19) $\mathbb{LDL} \cap \mathbb{N}^\mathbb{N} = \mathsf{PTIME} \cap \mathbb{N}^\mathbb{N}$

[First step: real sequences](#page-25-0)

Definition $f : \mathbb{R} \to \mathbb{R}$ is an effective limit of $\bar{f} : \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{N} \to \mathbb{R}$ if $|f(x) - \bar{f}(x, 2^n)| \leq 2^{-n}$

Key observation : \bar{f} computable in polynomial time \Rightarrow f computable in polynomial time.

We consider:

$$
\overline{\mathbb{LDL}^{\bullet}} = [0,1,\pi_{i}^{k},\ell(x),+,-,\times,\overline{\mathrm{cond}}(x),\frac{x}{2};
$$

composition, linear length ODE, effective limit]

Theorem (B., Bournez, MCU22) $\mathsf{FPTIME} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{N} = \overline{\mathbb{LDL}^\bullet} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{N}$

[Second step: functions over the](#page-29-0) [reals with discrete ODEs](#page-29-0)

\overline{\mathbb{LDL}^{\circ}} = [\mathbf{0}, \mathbf{1}, \pi_i^k, \ell(x), +, -, \text{tanh}, \frac{x}{2}, \frac{x}{3};
$$

Theorem (B., Bournez, MFCS23)

 $\overline{\mathbb{LDL}^{\circ}} \cap \mathbb{R}^{\mathbb{R}}$ = FPTIME $\cap \mathbb{R}^{\mathbb{R}}$

Definition (Robust linear ODE)

A bounded function f is a robustly linear ODE definable (with u essentially linear in $f(x, y)$, g and h) if:

1. it is a solution of

$$
f(0, y) = g(y)
$$
 and $\frac{\delta f(x, y)}{\delta x} = u(f(x, y), h(x, y), x, y),$

2. the ODE is (polynomially) numerically stable.

We consider:

$$
\overline{\mathbb{RLD}^{\circ}} = [\mathbf{0}, \mathbf{1}, \pi^k_i, \ell(x), +, -, \mathsf{tanh}, \frac{x}{2}, \frac{x}{3};
$$

composition, robust linear ODE, effective limit

Theorem (B., Bournez, MFCS23) $\overline{\mathbb{RLD}^\circ} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{R} = \mathsf{FPSPACE} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{R}$

[Third step: Functions over the reals](#page-34-0) [with continuous ODEs](#page-34-0)

A function $f : \mathbb{R} \to \mathbb{R}$ is robustly ODE definable (from initial condition g, and dynamic u) if

• it corresponds to the solution of the following continuous ODE:

$$
f(0, x) = g(x)
$$
 and $\frac{\partial f(t, x)}{\partial t} = u(f(t, x), h(t, x), t, x), (2)$

 \bullet $\exists \Delta \in \mathbb{Q}_{+}^{*}$, and some polynomial p such that the previous ODE is (polynomially) numerically stable on $[0, \Delta]$.

i.e. for all integer n, considering $\eta(n) = p(n + \ell(\mathbf{x}))$ we can compute $f(t, x)$ at 2^{-n} by working a precision $2^{-\eta(n)}$.

• For $t \geq \Delta$, we can compute $f(t, x)$ by computing some approximation $f(t/2, x)$ of $f(t/2, x)$ at precision $\epsilon(n)$.

i.e. of $\Phi(\mathbf{g}(x), t/2)$, and then some approximation of $\Phi(\widehat{f(t/2, y)}, t/2)$ at 2^{-n} , working at precision $2^{-\eta(n)}$.

$$
\overline{\mathbb{RCD}} = [0, 1, \pi_i^k, +, -, \times, \text{tanh}, \cos, \pi, \frac{x}{2}, \frac{x}{3};
$$

composition, robust ODE, ELim]

Theorem (B., Bournez, ICALP24 Track B) $\overline{\mathbb{RCD}} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{R} = \mathsf{FPSPACE} \cap \mathbb{R}^\mathbb{R}$
